

CELEBRATING

50 YEARS OF SERVICE

Creating better futures for children, families, and our community since 1974.

In 1974, Ron Mulholland and a group of like-minded individuals saw a need for youth and families in the community and formed what is now known as Youth Services System, Inc. (YSS). Six individuals signed the Articles of Incorporation: Ron Klug, Sue Abraham, and the late Rev. Gary Beale, Charles Gordon, Donald Carney, and Bruce Palatano. Ron Mulholland was a Marist Brother in the early seventies and was introduced to Ron Klug, who was working in the Youth Services Unit for the Department of Health and Human Services. After the two connected, the idea of Youth Services System, Inc. was born and soon after brought to life.

The agency was a first of its kind in West Virginia. After its inception on May 2, 1974, the agency opened the first emergency youth shelter in the state for boys in 1975, followed by the state's first emergency shelter for girls, the first Transitional Living Program, and the first privately operated juvenile facility. Since 2017, three recovery homes have become a part of YSS services.

Now, operating over 23 residential and communitybased services/programs within 9 facilities, YSS has built a foundation in the community and continues to live the mission: "To create a better future for children, families, and our community."

CARF ACCREDITATION



Youth Services System, Inc. has been awarded a three-year CARF Accredetation.

Tracy Hamilton, Quality Assurance Specialist, shared, "Over three days, January 29, 2024, through January 31, 2024, the CARF International team reviewed over 1700+ items throughout the agency for conformance to CARF standards during their re-evaluation of YSS, Inc. Per the Report. YSS, Inc. "demonstrated Accreditation substantial conformance to the standards." Our services were noted to be needed and appreciated, and YSS, Inc. was depended upon as a valued partner with its stakeholders. Leading up to the review, our staff worked diligently to ensure the highest quality of services were being provided throughout the agency and continue to do so. The leadership team and staff were "complimented and congratulated" for earning the achievement of a Three-Year Accreditation, which is the highest level achievable."

YEAR IN REVIEW

For over 50 years, Youth Services System, Inc. has been addressing the needs of youth and adults. We started due to the need for emergency shelters for boys and in 1974, we opened the first emergency shelter for boys, the Samaritan House, in West Virginia. Over the years, we have expanded or improved our services through the following:

- · Achieved 3-Year accreditation with the Commission on Accreditation of Rehabilitation Facilities (CARF) in early 2024, which "is an independent, nonprofit accreditor of health and human services in the following areas: Aging Services, Behavioral Health, Child and Youth Services, Vision Rehabilitation Services, Medical Rehabilitation, and Opioid Treatment Programs" (https://carf.org/)
- · Celebrated 50 years of service in April 2024
- · Welcomed three new Board Members: Chris Bucon, Michael Kuhn, and Melanee Sinclair
- · Hosted the 17th annual Celebrate Youth Festival at Wheeling Park in August 2023
- · Tuel Residential Living Program is now licensed through the Department of Human Services which opened doors for us to accept youth at the age of 17 in our Residential Transitional Living program
- · Became a provider for Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance (CSED) Waiver program. The additional services provided are for youth ages 3 to 21 with serious mental, emotional, or behavioral health needs
- · Expanded School Mental Health launched a new summer program called Hey U.G.L.Y. (Uniquely Gifted Lovable You). This initiative was carried out through seven schools in Ohio, Marshall, Brooke, and Hancock Counties
- · Youth Opportunities Unlimited Youth Workforce Program Year-Long Work Experience opportunities and enhancement of a virtual reality training platform
- · Launched Credible Solutions, an electronic medical record program funded by Aetna Better Health of West Virginia
- · Helinski Shelter was the recipient of the Kentucky Fried Wishes Grant in August
- · Capital Projects: Ronald C. Mulholland brick façade support, updated recreation yard and outdoor seating, Samaritan House Roof, Helinski Shelter received a new fence plus, Tuel Residential Living Program received new siding, fascia, gutters, and garage doors

Y.O.U. Employment Program Helps Youth & Families

A young man was registered into the Y.O.U. Employment Program last June. While living with his girlfriend and infant daughter, he interviewed for a job at a local hardware store and was hired on part-time. He would walk or ride his bike 1.5 miles to and from work for every shift he was scheduled. Taking initiative, he then reached out to us here at YSS and requested some time be set aside for him to practice his driving skills. For 3 months, he and a YSS staff member would make time between his work schedule and fatherly duties to practice driving. He took the test and passed, earning his official driver's license. Though he had his driver's license, he still did not have a car for about 4 months; he continued to walk or ride his bike to and from work. Through his diligence, good work ethic, and prioritization of what is important to him and his family, he was able to save enough money to purchase his first car in March of this year (2024)! He is still employed at Tractor Supply and can now drive himself to and from work. He has expressed his gratefulness to the Y.O.U Employment Program and the YSS staff that helped him step by step to become a licensed driver!

A young girl exhibited truancy issues that led to her removal from her mother's care and into placement with her grandparents. Her school attendance improved with appropriate supervision. Safe-At-Home was able to refer her for individual therapy services. Safe-At-Home was able to encourage her to wake in the mornings to prevent tardiness and present her with rewards for her positive behavior. Her truancy and tardiness issues seemed to decline drastically at the time of closure.

One boy exhibited truancy issues at the time of referral. Safe-At-Home was able to refer him for a psychological evaluation to determine any further needs. He receives medication for his ADHD, and he seems to function well in school. He has maintained school attendance this current school year.





About the Program

Our homes serve men and women ages 18 and older who are working to get their lives back on track after treatment. The length of stay is 6 months, during which time a resident can build on strengths learned in treatment, get back to school, and look for employment while living in a safe home among others in recovery.

Our Purpose

We believe in a client-centric approach, tailoring our services to meet the unique needs and objectives of each organization. Our seasoned consultants work closely with clients to understand their challenges, develop strategic roadmaps, and execute effective solutions.

Successful Outcomes

In the past year, 17 people graduated from our program all moving into their independent living situations, working full-time jobs, and many are still actively involved in the recovery community helping and supporting others on their recovery journeys. Our alumni are involved in the Recovery Homes by taking residents to meetings, serving as references for jobs, supervising volunteer efforts, and some are engaged in service terms with AmeriCorps. One of our alumni is serving on the board of directors of a local non-profit while serving as an AmeriCorps. Another is a supervisor at a gas & oil company. One has procured a job with the City of Wheeling and works with people every day to reduce the stigma around people who have been incarcerated and people in recovery from Substance Use Disorders. Two of our alumni are getting married and have invited staff to attend and officiate the ceremony. Our alumni have graduated from drug treatment courts at the federal and state levels, and have been invited to speak at graduation ceremonies. As we continue to serve people from around the state of West Virginia, we look forward to welcoming people into their newfound lives in recovery and watching them grow and develop into the people they are capable of becoming.

PREVENTION IN OUR COMMUNITY

Youth Services System, Inc. is designated as the Region 1
Prevention Lead Organization for the WV DHHS Bureau
for Behavioral Health and the Office of Drug Control
Policy, providing prevention, early intervention, and harm
reduction services in Hancock, Brooke, Ohio, Marshall,
and Wetzel counties, in the Northern Panhandle of West
Virginia.

The Prevention Services Department, known to the community as Prevention North, supports community-based coalitions in the delivery of comprehensive evidence-based prevention strategies.

We are trained to provide strategies aimed at decreasing substance use among high-risk WV youth, reducing prescription drug misuse, as well as reducing the negative outcomes associated with Substance Use Disorder by providing intensive community preventative measures.

YSS offers several different prevention services for youth and adults such as:

- Naloxone Administration Training and Dissemination of Naloxone Kits
- Outreach, Education & Promotion of Harm Reduction & Treatment Services, including Medication for Opioid Use Disorder

RESIDENTIAL PROGRAMS

Youth Services System, Inc. operates two emergency shelters for boys and girls and two youth residential facilities.

Samaritan House

Samaritan House was originally opened in 1975 on 13th Street in Wheeling. The shelter was West Virginia's first emergency shelter for boys ages 8-17.

Samaritan House was the first initiative that Ron Mulholland and YSS supporters assumed when the agency first started. Many individuals in the community sent letters to the Wheeling City Council and Mayor, asking for public funding.

The needs for the capeutic care and safety are assessed to determine the best plan for the child and the best environment to make progress.

Helinski Shelter

Helinski Shelter was established in 1983 at Grand Vue Park in Moundsville. This was West Virginia's first emergency shelter for girls ages 8-17. With the help of the West Liberty University Women's Soccer team, Helinski Shelter moved to its current location on Wheeling Island in 2017. The shelter provides room and board, supervision, and emergency shelter services to children in need. Helinski and the Samaritan House provides services to runaway and homeless youth, and is a designated Safe Place.

In FY 2024, YSS helped a total of

youth in our emergency shelters and TLP.



Transitional Living

YSS works with youth from the ages of 17-21 to build life skills, education, and work experience for a solid foundation towards becoming independent adults in the community. Our Transitional Living Program (TLP) began working with youth aging out of foster care in 1981. Our services offer support, training, and housing in a three-step process at our Tuel Residential Living Program in New Martinsville, the McCrary Training Center in Wheeling, and in the community. YSS also secures apartments in the community once individuals are ready to take the third step of the TLP.

Brittany's Story

There are success stories that remind us that what we do is important. One of these stories is about Brittany Wilson. She was a young girl who needed our guidance and support. Margo, Residential Manager of Helinski Shelter, was there to help lead Brittany down the right path. Years later, Brittany is the Assistant Manager at KFC. Brittany had the opportunity to help connect YSS with the Kentucky Fried Wishes Foundation, which allowed YSS to share Brittany's story and connection to YSS. Her story led them to donate \$10,000 to YSS. Brittany was there the day the check was presented.

Angelica's Story

Angelica spent eight months in the Transitional Living Program. During this time, staff encouraged her to stay in school and supported her through graduation. She attended West Liberty University (WLU) and majored in 2D Studio Art with a minor in Education and Creative Art Therapy. Angelica keeps in touch with the staff and is doing very well on her own. She recently shared, "I'd like you to know that I am doing so very well in New Castle! All thanks to YSS helping me finish college! I Preached my first sermon yesterday! And I'm Working a big girl salary Job at a school in New Brighton for special needs kids (I'm with the preschoolers) as their behavior technician." Angelica has also been accepted into the Christian Ministry Master's program at WLU.



RONALD C. MULHOLLAND JUVENILE CENTER

In FY 2024, the RCMJC served <u>237</u> youth.

Before the Juvenile Center opened, West Virginia would place troubled youth in adult jail cells. Ron Mulholland and concerned community members saw the desperate need for a place for boys to turn to receive appropriate care. At the time, boys who were in jail were being punished for petty crimes, or sometimes "bad behavior" such as skipping classes; schools did not have the resources to confront these children, so they were placed in jail. On March 28, 1977, Rev. Gary Beale wrote a letter to the Wheeling City Council. "Jail is no place for children," he wrote. Beale continued, "The present lock-up facilities in the City/County building for juveniles are a travesty. Children are confined in unbearable conditions without adequate space, ventilation, light, or plumbing. A bucket is no substitution for a bathroom." Gary served as a Board of Directors Member for several years and served on the Emeritus Board until his passing in 2022. In 1986, the state's first juvenile facility emerged. In 2014, the facility was renamed the Ronald C. Mulholland Juvenile Center (RCMJC) in memory of founder Ron Mulholland. After completing their rehabilitation commitments, residents continue to lead successful lives; some complete their sentencing and move back into our Transitional Living Program for continued support.

SUCCESS STORIES

Linda Scott, Superintendent at RCMJC, shared a success story of a couple she spent time with years ago. The couple pictured on the right and below met while at our Juvenile Center. Years later, they married and adopted a little girl. During the adoption process, she became pregnant with her little boy. Now, they are thriving and enjoying their happy family. She works as a Drug Coach, helping others through their struggles and to find their way to recovery.



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FOR 50 YEARS

AND COUNTING

From the beginning in 1974, Brother Ron Mulholland set up the Samaritan house for success. Months before our 50th-year celebration, we stumbled across a binder, A Study of the Organizational Development of the Samaritan House, June 1975- 1979 by James Edward Schmidt - Sociology December 1979. What seems to be a college project in 1979, has turned into an incredible time capsule for those who are working with our youth and families today. The following time line gives a glimpse of how we continue to provide a safe place for youth, reconnecting families and building relationships throughout our community.

HISTORY OF CARING Youth-focused, community-based group 1974: Ohio County Youth Services System is founded.

1975: Samaritan House begins. First emergency shelter for boys in WV

1981: Transitional Living Program opens. First WV licensed independent living program for youth exiting foster care

2000: Tuel Crisis Center begins in New Martinsville. Emergency shelter

2000: McCrary Center opens on Wheeling Island. Community-based services center

2014: YSS becomes Regional Youth Services Center provider. Referral, assessment diagnostic, outpatient counseling and transitional living/support services for ages 12-25 in WV

1983: Helinski Shelter begins at Grand Vue Park, Moundsville. First emergency shelter for girls in WV

2017: Helinski Shelter moves to Wheeling Island

1986: Northern Regional Juvenile Center opens. WV's first privately operated secure juvenile facility

2003: Hope's Promise opens. Intensive outpatient program for youth with substance use disorders

2014: Northern Regional Juvenile Center is renamed the Ronald C. Mulholland Juvenile Center.

1990: Elm Grove Elementary School Before- and After-care begins

2013: After-Care programs begin at McNinch Primary and Central Elementary, Moundsville.

2005: Project Safe Place begins. First and only WV Safe Place affiliate; outreach for runaway and homeless youth

2005: Ohio County Substance Abuse Prevention Coalition (OCSAPC) begins. Youth Services System works with other community partners for prevention efforts, supported by WV's <u>Strategic Prevention Framework State Incentive Grant (SPF SIG)</u>.

2009: OCSAPC wins Federal Drug-Free Communities Grant.

2015: OCSAPC Faith Team holds the first Day of Hope. Statewide event every September. Bringing together faith communities in support of people is all stages: active, treatment, and recovery

2016: Prevent Suicide WV collaboration begins (through Regional Youth Services Center).

2016: OCSAPC changes name to Community Impact Coalition.

2019: Inaugural Discover Recovery An annual treatment and recovery fair open to the public.

2019: Prevention Services begins. The department started with OCSAPC/Community Impact Coalition and includes US and WV grants

that support programs such as Partnerships for Success, Northern Panhandle Prevention Consortium, State Opioid

2022: Recovery Resource & Help Center opens in New Martinsville, WV. A collaborative initiative between YSS and Take Action Wetzel

County. New YSS Post Overdose Response Team base

2008: Youth Employment and Training Program begins through the Northern Panhandle Workforce Investment Board

2014: Expanded School-Based Mental Health services begin at Triadelphia, Moundsville, Follansbee, and Wellsburg & Oak Glen Middle Schools.

2015: Added Long Drain Middle.

2018: Expanded School-Based Mental Health expands to Brooke Intermediate South, Steenrod, Central and Long Drain Elementary Schools.

2014: Paden City satellite office opens.

2016: Youth Mentoring Network begins. Continuing the work of Big Brothers Big Sisters after it disbanded locally

2017: Sophie Moses Free Store opens. Serves anyone in need of clothing, shoes, household goods

2017: YSS pilots Quiet Minds program. With WVDHHR to assist youth and families following a first episode of psychosis. It is implemented across the state

2017: Lazarus and Mary and Martha House Recovery Homes are opened.

2020: Mark's House, the second Recovery Home for men, opened.

2019: Family Coordinator program and Adult/Youth Peer Recovery programs begin
